2015: This will be remembered as a landmark year for CharityVision. We made the conscious decision to take our successes and lessons learned to the next level. The debilitating condition of blindness is far too preventable, and yet far too prevalent. Even with the efforts of many capable international organizations, we struggle to keep pace with new cases. CharityVision's unique philosophy to empower the local doctor as the solution is the only way we can get on top of this. To help those in need we have decided to grow beyond our comfortable expectations.

By the end of this decade it's estimated that the number of needlessly blind individuals will actually double. Eradicating blindness will require more than just our efforts—it will demand more than the capacity of our current team of volunteers and donors. But that cannot dissuade us. We can “move the needle”; we can make a difference in the world!

Throughout 2015 we concentrated on creating a stronger foundation here at our home office and abroad. We made some significant strides aimed towards growing

our donor pool, we initiated our first annual Fight Night and achieved national media attention, we began offering services (and glasses) to Title 1 schools here at home, we organized a for-profit subsidiary with the goal to eventually cover our own overhead, and we partnered on four strategically placed clinics.

We are so thankful for all of our partners. We implore you to help us find more people like yourselves. Will you introduce us to two of your friends? 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CHARITYVISION

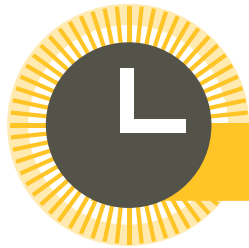

Our vision goes beyond simply restoring sight; we believe we will revitalize communities and, ultimately, nations.

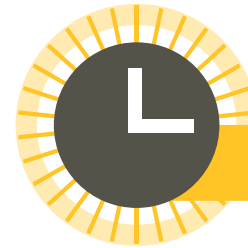
WHY VISION?

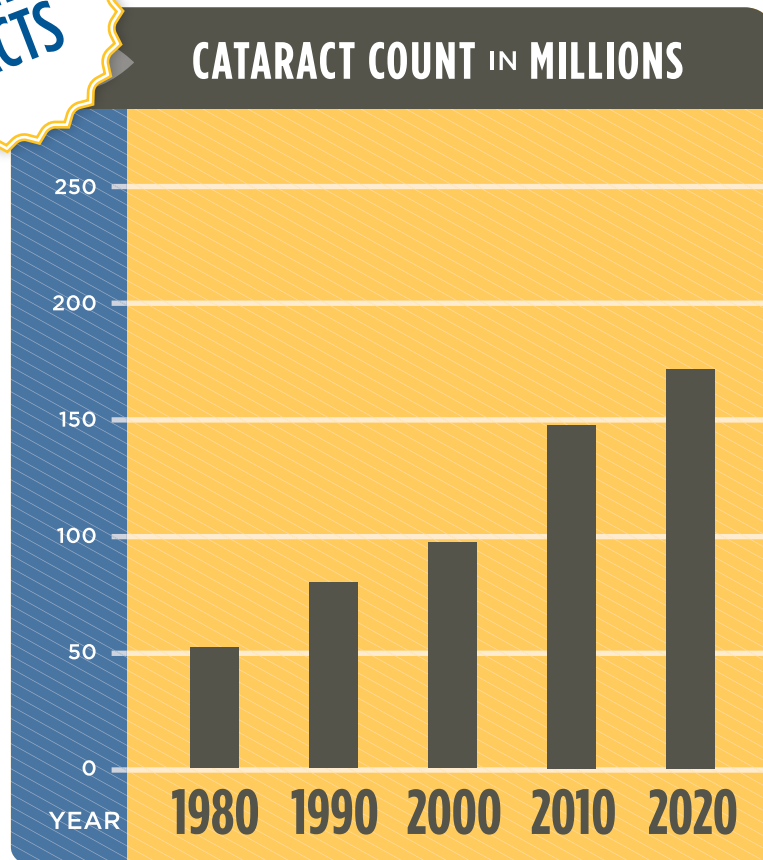

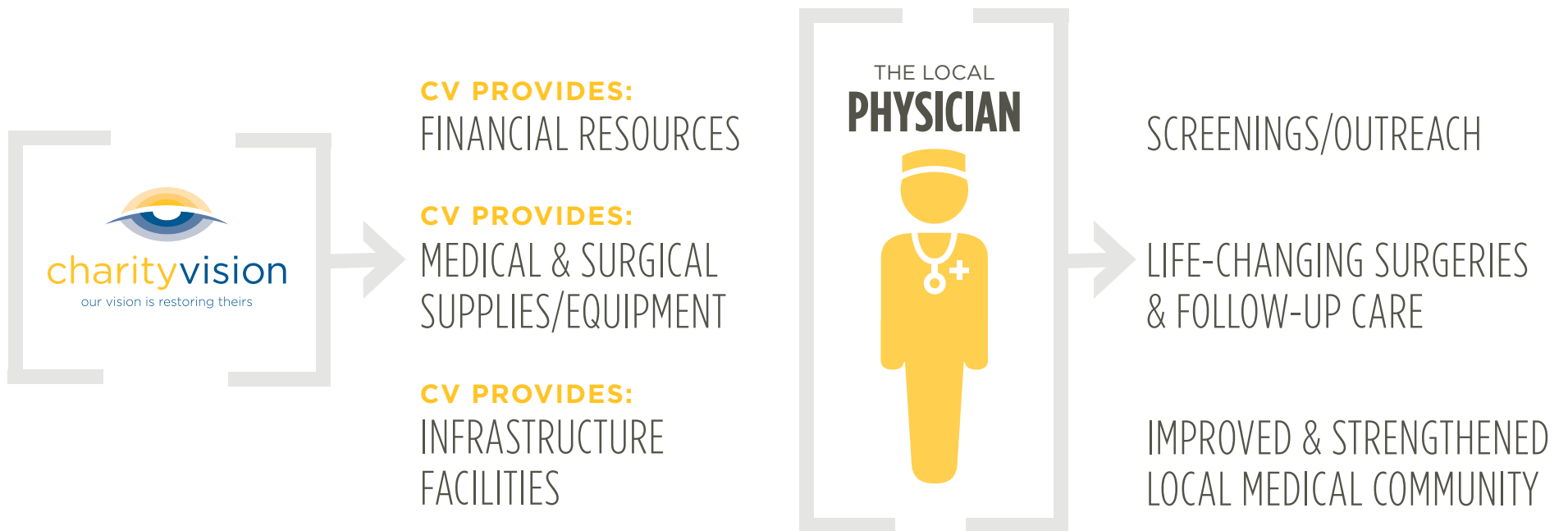


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OUR MODEL

HIGHLIGHTS

CV FIGHT NIGHT

We pride ourselves in putting the *fun* back in fundraising! On May 15th, the first annual CV Fight Night took place in Salt Lake City with over 1,000 fans packed into the Rail Event Center. Mitt Romney and 5-time world champion Evander Holyfield stepped into the ring and “battled it out” in a celebrity boxing match to raise funds for CharityVision’s never-ending fight against blindness. The evening was filled with other professional bouts, high-end live auction items, and guest celebrities. By the time the gloves were off, almost \$1MM had been raised, which enabled us to perform over 40,000 sight-restoring surgeries. We must thank the generous partners and donors that made this all possible, especially the Sorenson Legacy Foundation.

Race4Sight FUNDRAISER



In November 2015, we hosted our 2nd annual Race 4 Sight. Donors and corporate partners joined us at a local slick track to celebrate our efforts right here in the state of Utah. Race 4 Sight was a fun family event complete with arcade games, plenty of racing, and more than enough BBQ for all those in attendance! It was a pleasure to share this adrenaline-fueled evening with so many of our partners. Our Utah Vision Initiative benefits low-income students in need of vision screenings and prescription glasses.

All bets were *on* during our first-ever Casino Night last August. A small group of CharityVision friends and supporters gathered around blackjack and poker tables, dealing cards and throwing chips to raise funds for our international vision programs. The odds were good all night long as each winning pot translated into hundreds of people regaining their sight. In the end, Casino Night proved that curing blindness is a winning hand!

India EXPEDITION

Mitt Romney and CharityVision executives hosted 14 donors on a nine-day expedition through India in January 2015. After visiting landmarks and sacred sites in Delhi, Agra, Jaipur, and Varanasi, participants witnessed the power of CharityVision donations in action. In the small town of Neemrana, we performed vision screenings for hundreds of community members. Many children and adults received corrective glasses on the spot; others received their new prescription lenses within a few days. One of the most poignant experiences of our trip happened in a rural community outside Dehli. Our guests witnessed the miracle of giving sight to the blind. In a dramatic removal of one woman's eye bandages, and through tears of joy and gratitude, she gave a heartfelt "Namaste!" She told CharityVision donors "I am a poor woman--all I have to give you is my blessing."

meet THE GANO SISTERS

The Gano sisters both needed cornea transplants in order to potentially see. But corneas are not easy to come by and they're quite expensive. After CharityVision made a trip to an eye bank in Manila and endured a long six-month wait, we received two corneas. Two corneas would only provide one girl sight. Together, Deborah and Dona decided that rather than have one Gano girl see and the other remain in darkness, they would share the corneas. This way they'd both get a limited view of the world around them. Surgery was a success. Both girls have vision in one eye. Sight, even if by one eye, has transformed their lives. Significantly.

meet **MICHAEL**

CharityVision put down roots in Columbia last year. In Cartagena, we met a first grader named Michael Sanchez who needed an eye test. His vision was negative 4 in each eye. Poor Michael could only see blurry shapes on the chalkboard. Neither his parents nor his teachers had any idea he was struggling to see. The good news is we outfitted Michael with a pair of glasses. Letters and numbers on the chalkboard are now visible. Michael's opportunities are now as clear as his eyesight, and we couldn't be more thrilled. Our vision is restoring theirs!

meet DEBULI

Like so many of the elderly, Debuli's eyes began to weaken with age. On the day she couldn't see her granddaughter, she was shocked and embarrassed. She recognized her sight was not the only thing that had been compromised—so was her peace of mind. In that moment, Debuli thought it's better to die than to live without good eye sight. She was having difficulty cooking. Basic things like eating and drinking were a daily struggle. Fear consumed her. What if she never saw her grandchildren's faces again? Fortunately for Debuli, a Nepalese CharityVision doctor restored her sight and her autonomy. Needless to say, the doctor restored her happiness as well.



vision **INITIATIVE**

Blindness is not the only epidemic we're battling. Approximately 640 million people worldwide are visually impaired because they cannot access or afford eyeglasses. More than 13 million children miss out on an effective education because they can't see well enough to learn. So we began a U.S. Vision Initiative to provide glasses for children with visual needs. We've encouraged and helped our international partners do the same. Children, once believed to be "slow" or "shy," were simply living blurred lives. Last year, we screened over 20,000 school children. Better yet, we supplied 70,220 people with glasses to put life back in focus; progress is now within their reach.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S LETTER



We have audited the accompanying financial statements of CharityVision International, Inc. the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.
